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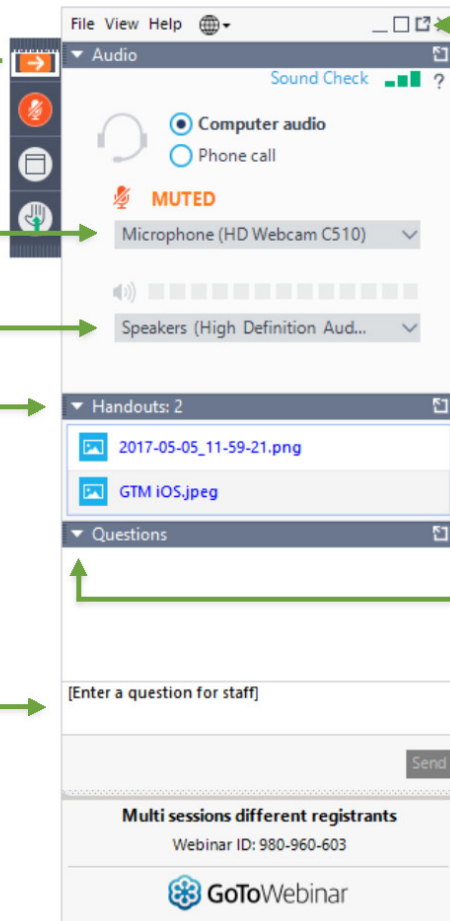
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Community cat

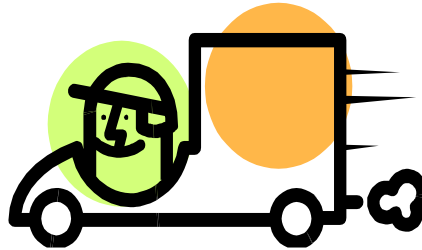
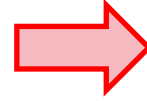
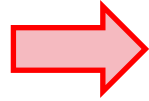
- Free-roaming, unowned (aka “ferals,” “strays”)
- Socialization can range from friendly to feral



Colony

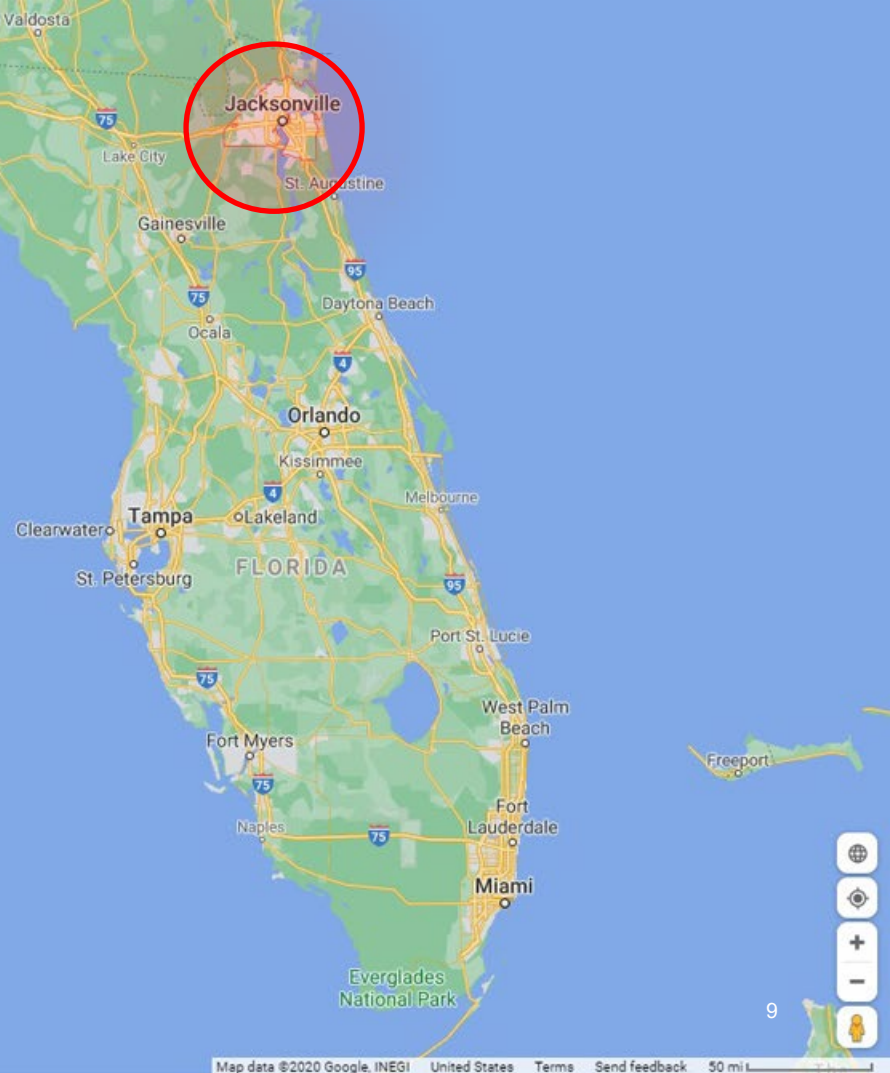
- A group of community cats who share a common food source and territory
- Can be 1 or more
- Might include roaming pets

What is Return-to-field?

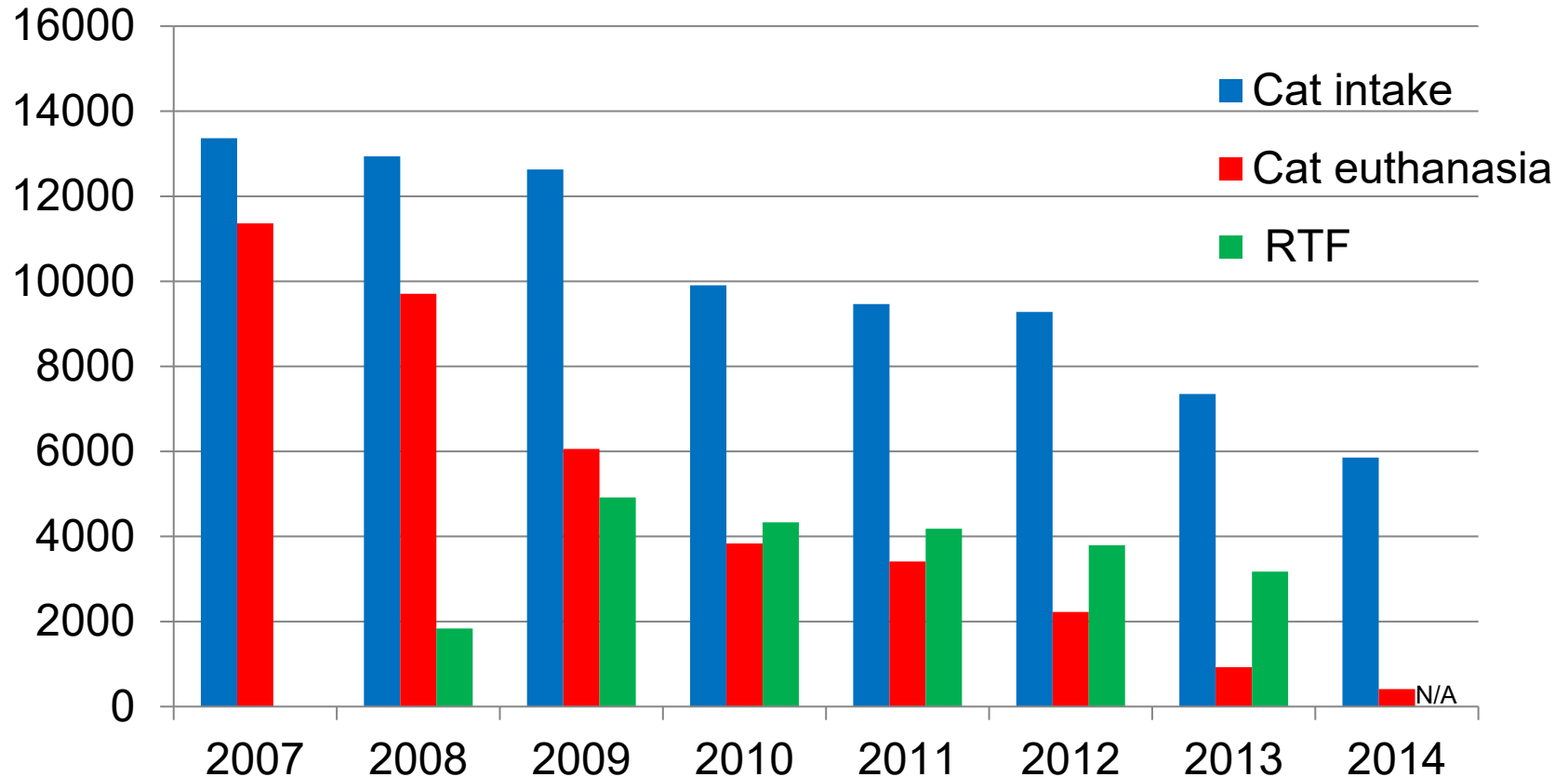


Origins of RTF

- 2008: First Coast No More Homeless Pets meets with Jacksonville Animal Care & Protective Services
- FCNMHP asks to return eartipped shelter cats to their colonies
- Director of JACPS offers to let FCNMHP s/n and return all impounded community cats

Why stop euthanizing?

No improvement in:

- Intake & euthanasia rates
- Complaint calls
- Number of community cats

Costs of euthanasia:

- High stress
- High turnover
- Poor public relations
- Lower adoptions



Why does lethal control fail?

- Too many cats, too few animal control resources
- Caretaker resistance
- Failure to capture all colony members
- Vacuum effect

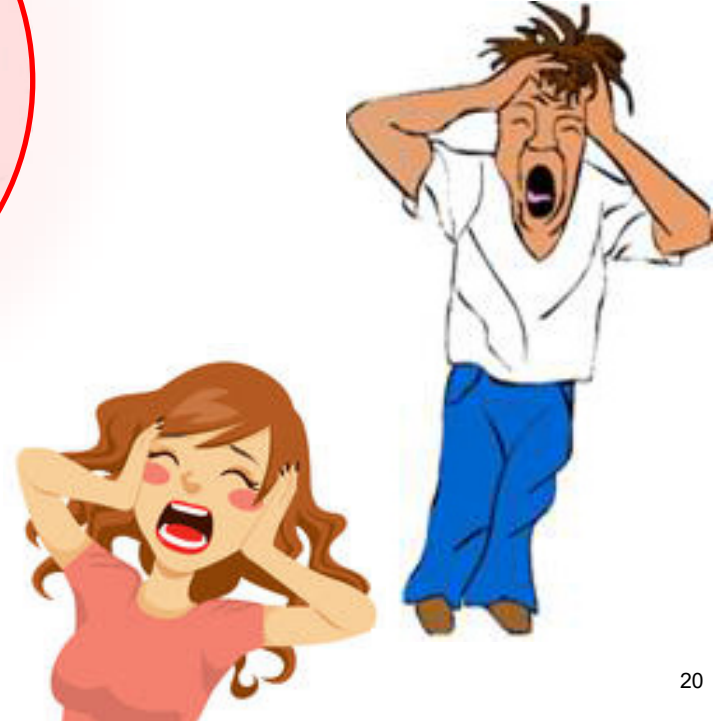


RTF benefits

- Lower euthanasia
- Freed-up resources
- Healthier shelter environment (less crowding)
- Public support (fundraising, adoptions)
- Culture change – inside and outside shelter
- Avoid euthanasia of roaming pets

2014 national survey

commissioned by Best Friends Animal Society

Question: What is your preference among these 3 options for managing community cats?

- a) Sterilize and vaccinate healthy stray cats, and return them to where they were captured (sometimes called trap-neuter-return) **68%**
- b) Impoundment by shelter staff, followed by lethal injection for any cats not adopted **24%**
- c) Do nothing/leave stray cats alone to fend for themselves **8%**

2008 survey of Ohio adults

- 43% of participants saw free-roaming cats in their neighborhoods on a daily or weekly basis
- 26% had fed free-roaming cats during the prior year

Return-to-field is aligned with the majority who favor live outcomes and are willing to leave community cats in the environment

Euthanasia is aligned with the minority who complain about the cats and want them removed





Fear: People will harm the cats.

Fact: That is a risk, but widespread abuse has not been reported.

Fear: People will complain to local officials.

Fact: Some will. It's important to educate policymakers.

Fear: Cat owners won't get a chance to reclaim their pets.

Fact: National reclaim average for cats is 2%. Better chance of going home if returned.

Friendly cats

To consider:

- Shelter's capacity for care
- Cat's history, community ties
- Goal of reducing free-roaming population
- Recommended: an individual assessment of what is the best available outcome
- Avoid an auto-pilot approach

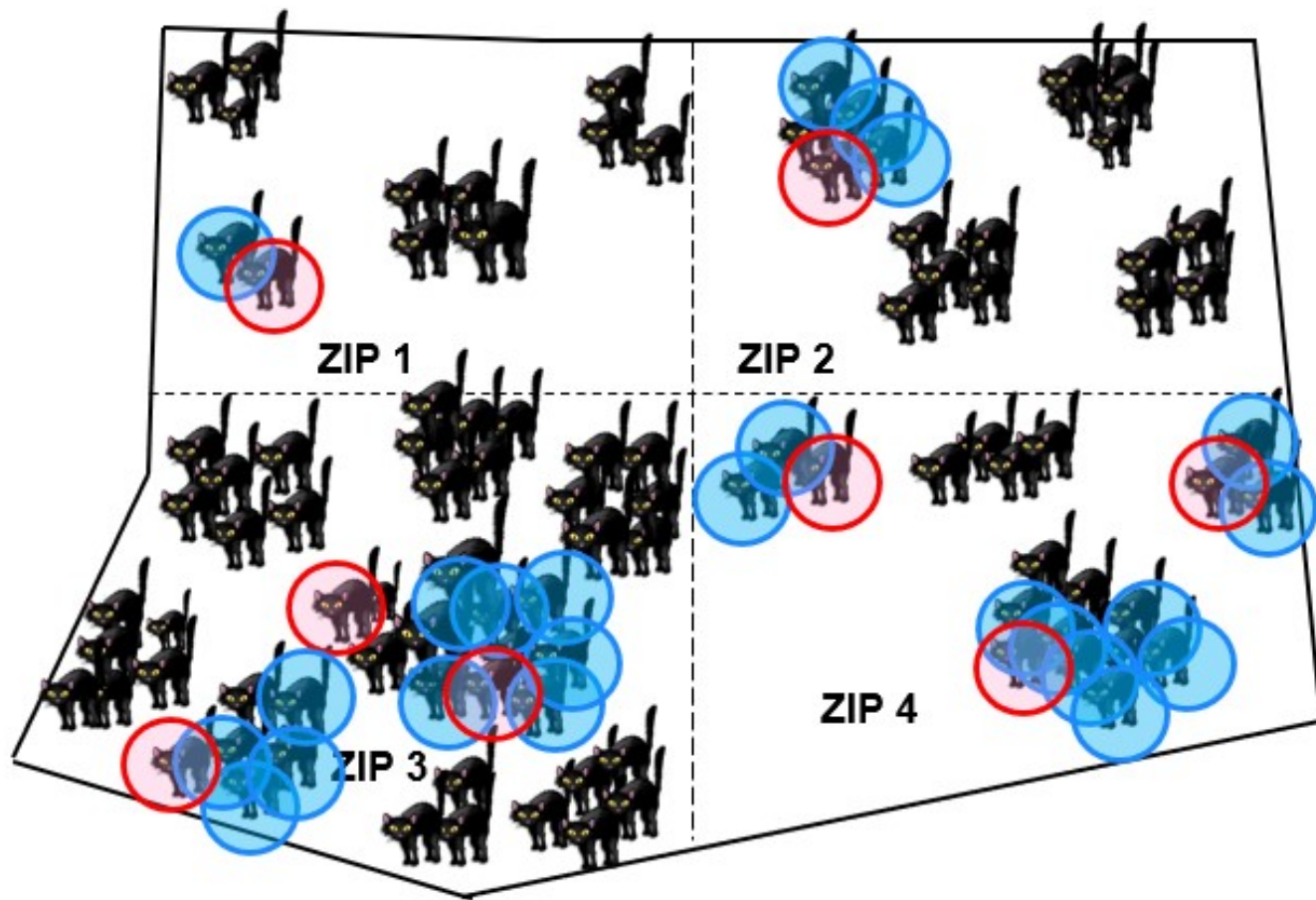

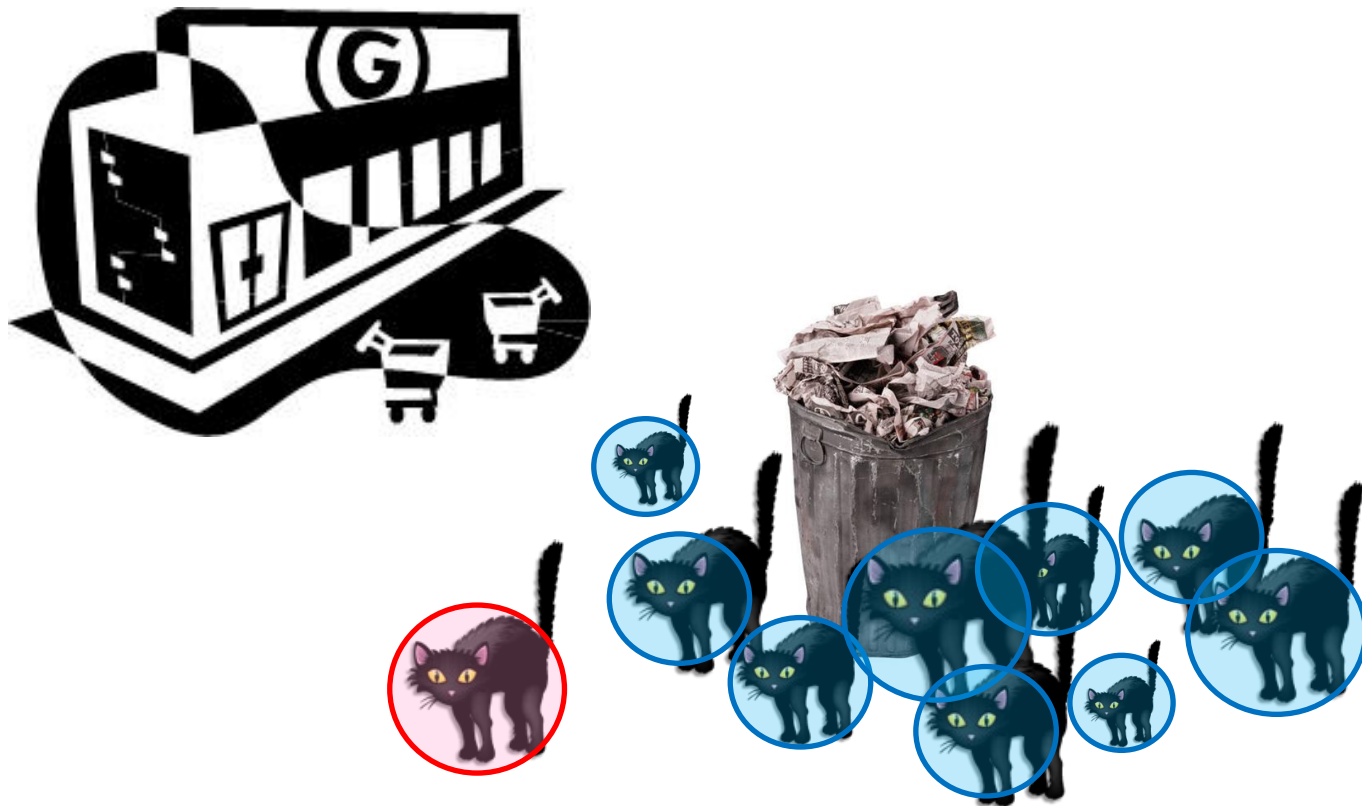

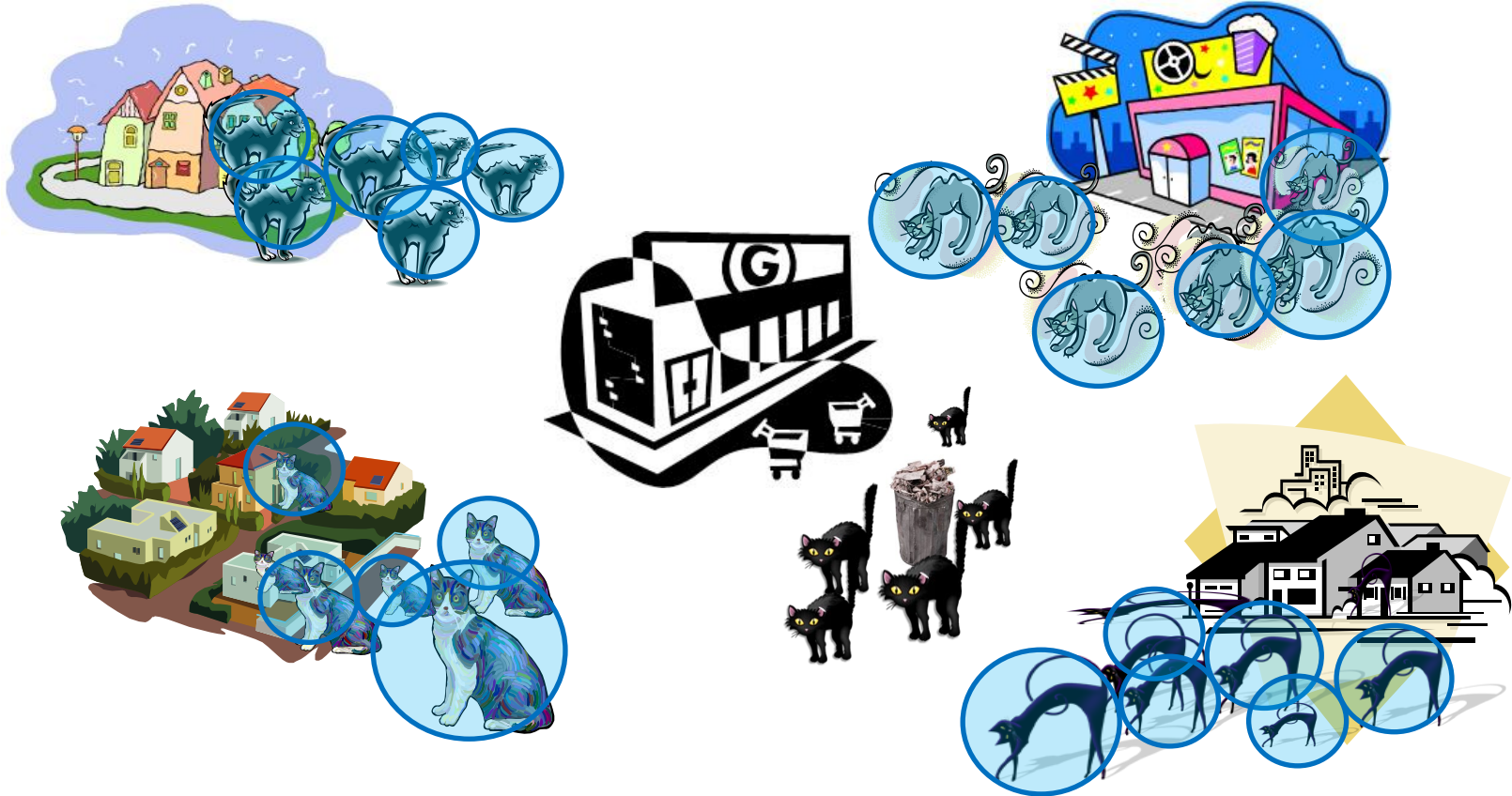

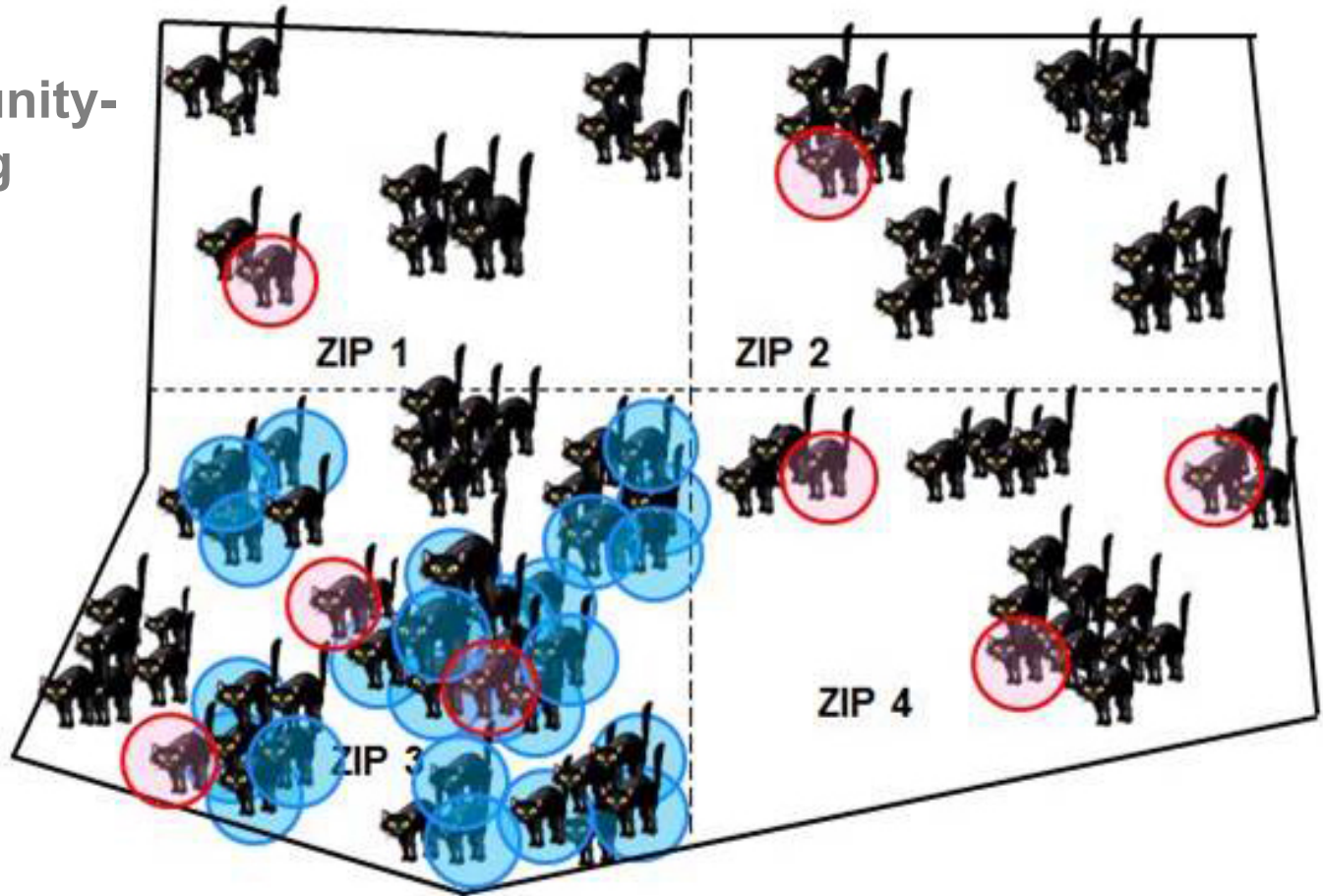

Colony-level targeting

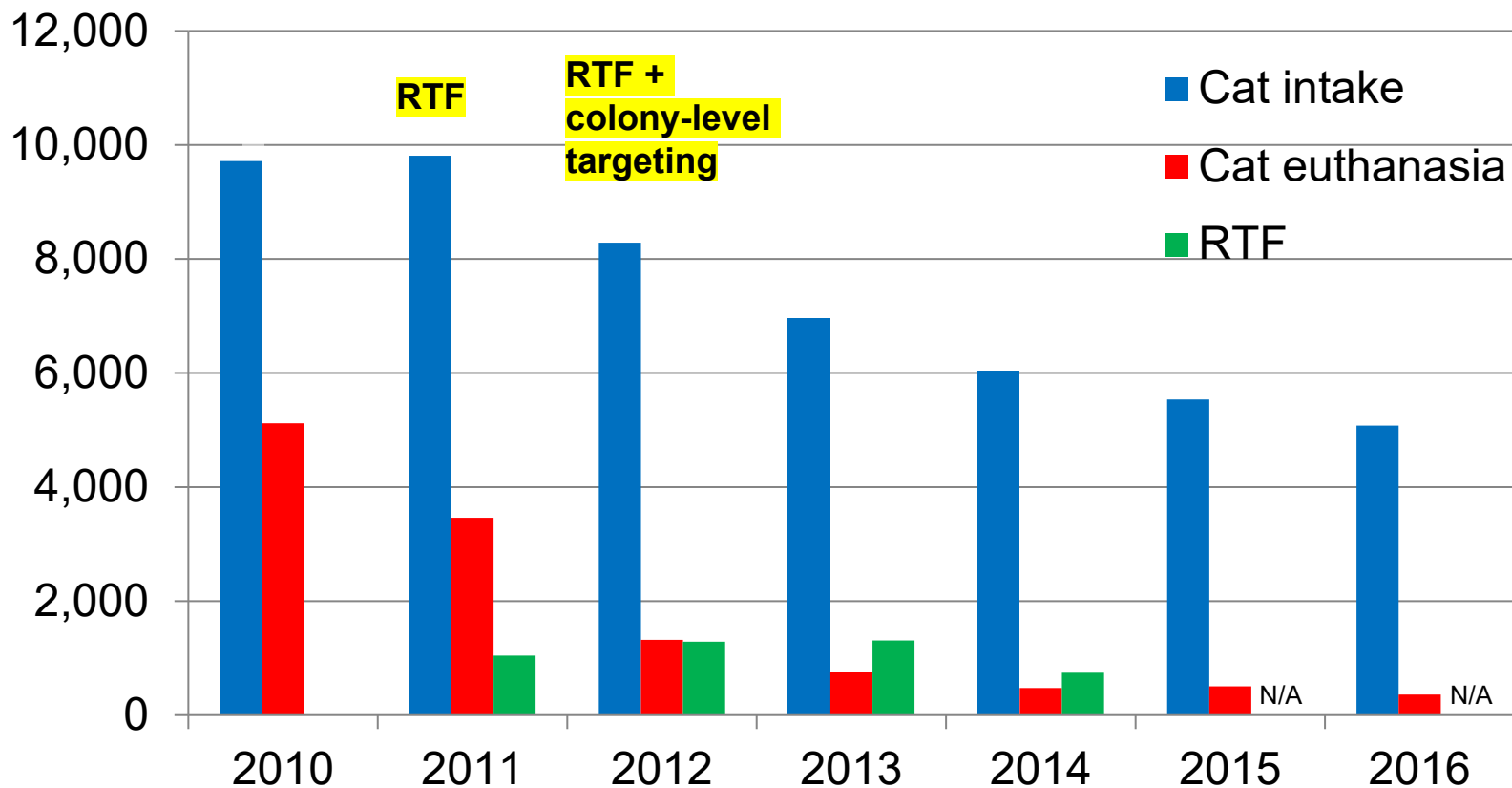
- Added to RTF program

- Launched in July 2010

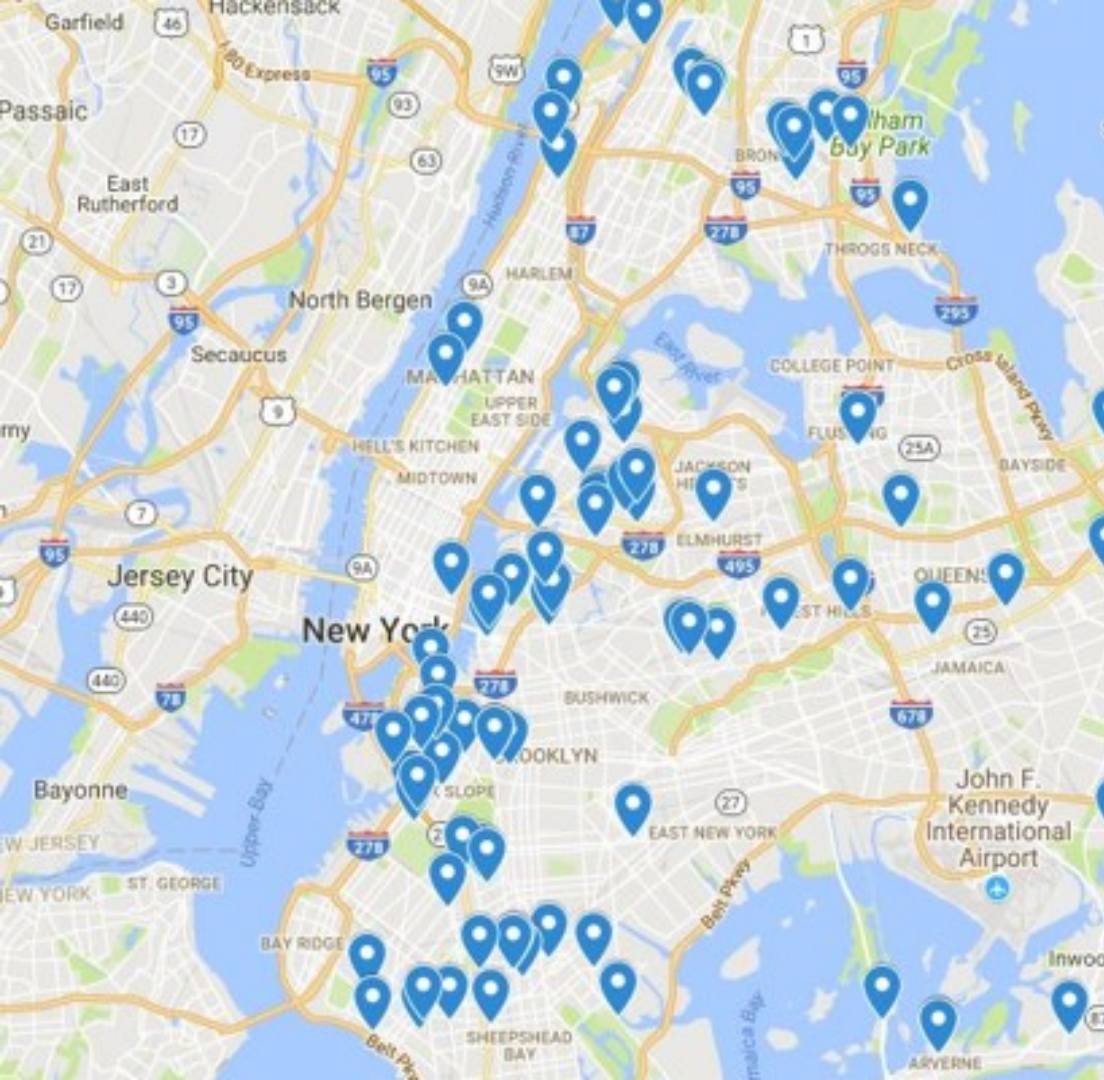

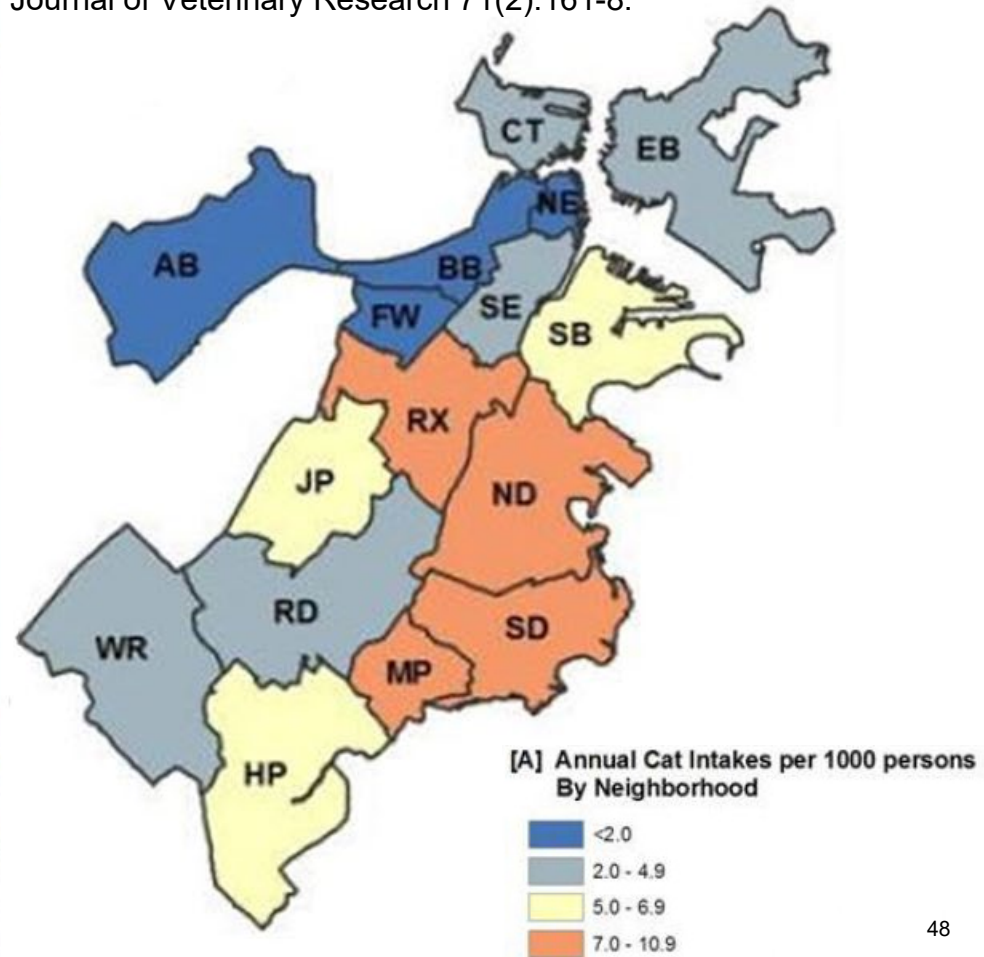
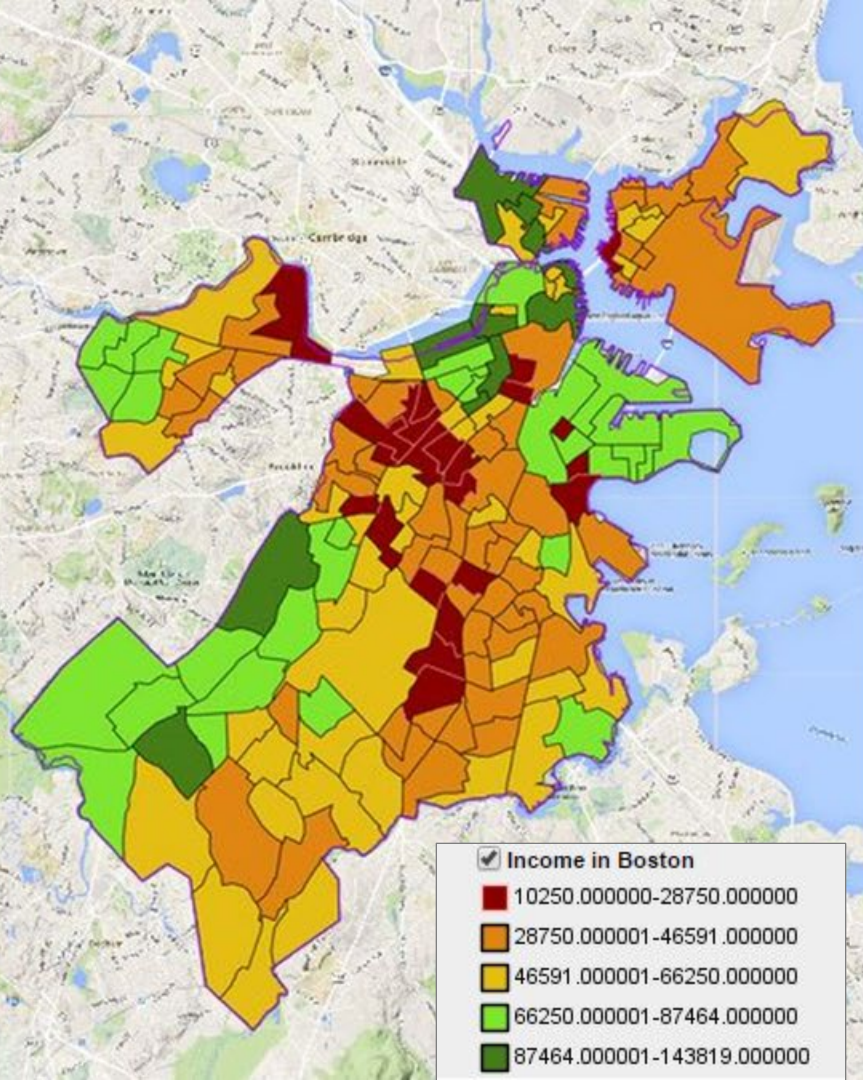

Identifying high need areas

- Intake into local shelters broken down by location of origin (GIS mapping)
- Complaint calls/requests for assistance by location.
- Tribal knowledge (experience of local animal welfare groups, animal control, shelters)
