Cat Counts: Calculating Impact

Cat Counts was a pilot targeted Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) project through the San Diego Humane Society. The project began by learning about the DC Cat Count model, which introduced data-driven cat management in Washington, DC. In the first operating year of the Community Cat Program, the project has encountered countless stories of dedication and compassion by trappers, caretakers, and community members. The project opted for a community outreach / TNR hybrid and took a collaborative approach within and outside of the organization. The project moved forward with the goal of gathering not only quantitative data to show the impact of a targeted TNR program, but qualitative data as well to better understand how San Diego Humane Society can best support our community and the cats that roam it.

About Zarah Hedge, DVM, MPH, DACVPM, DABVP,

Zarah graduated from Western University of Health Sciences in 2009. She completed the shelter medicine internship and three-year shelter medicine residency program at the Oregon Humane Society in conjunction with Oregon State University. Zarah received her Master's in Public Health with the University of Minnesota in 2013 and board certification in Veterinary Preventive Medicine in 2014. After completing her residency, she worked as a veterinarian at San Diego Humane Society for two years before becoming an Assistant Professor of Shelter Medicine and Western University of Health Sciences College of Veterinary Medicine. Zarah worked as hospital director at WesternU Spay/Neuter Center in Van Nuys. Zarah received board certification in Shelter Medicine (ABVP) in 2017 and in the summer of 2019, she once again joined the San Diego Humane Society as their Chief Medical Officer. In this role, she oversees a medical team of over 100 staff at four different locations in San Diego County. She also continues to serve as a reserve field veterinarian for Rural Area Veterinary Services, a program of The Fund for Animals.

Global Cat Management

The humane management of cats has proved to be more challenging than the humane management of dogs. In part, this is due to the success of the domestic cat in reverting to a feral state and successful survival in a wide variety of ecosystems. The first step in addressing humane cat management is understanding and addressing the distinction between cats that are totally or partly reliant on human support and those that have reverted back to a wild state. Cats that are reliant in part on human support can, and should, be distinguished from the truly feral Felis domesticus when it comes to management

options. These differences will be outlined and discussed and the relevance of TNVR approaches for specific cat groups around the world will be addressed.

About Andrew Rowan

Dr. Andrew Rowan has more than 40 years of experience in animal welfare science and in animal and environmental advocacy. He has served on many government and corporate consultative committees, on numerous Boards of national and international NGOs and most recently served as the CEO of Humane Society International for 20 years and as the Board Chair of the Humane Society Wildlife Land Trust. Dr. Rowan was a professor at Tufts Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine where he established the Tufts Center for Animals and Public Policy, launched an academic journal on human-animal relations (Anthrozoos), launched the first Master's degree in the world on animals and public policy (1995), and served for several years as Chair of the Department of Environmental Sciences. He has authored or co-authored numerous books and over one hundred academic papers. He is a recipient of the Rhodes Scholarship and has received numerous awards for his work.
