Caring for FeLV+ Cats

Our approach to treating and talking about the FeLV cats in our care can have a huge impact on their overall outcomes and quality of life. We know FeLV is transmissible, but not easily so. And while FeLV+ kitties may live a shorter life, they can still have a good quality of life. Through this presentation, we will overcome our own fear of the disease and learn to talk frankly with adopters about adopting a cat with a shorter life span.

About Dr. Heather Kennedy

Heather is the Director of Feline Operations at KC Pet Project. Her role encompasses all aspects of feline operations, including animal care, health and enrichment, behavior, and feline fostering. Her career helping cats started as an experienced cat trapper, colony caregiver, and foster caregiver. She went on to attend U.C. Davis School of Veterinary Medicine, where her singular commitment to cats earned her numerous scholarships, as well as the AAFP Outstanding Scholar Award. In 2017, after four years in feline-only private practice, Heather decided to focus on the welfare of shelter cats. She is recognized as an expert on the humane care of feral cats and currently sits on the AAFP Committee on Free-Roaming Cats and speaks at national conferences on her work in sheltering. She was mentored by Dr. Niels Pedersen, a nationally recognized expert on feline infectious peritonitis, and she often provides consults to other veterinarians on the diagnosis of the disease. She managed the Alley Cat Allies emergency shelter after Hurricane Katrina and was instrumental in helping Santa Barbara County (CA) become no-kill through TNR and RTF (Return to Field). She started and managed a feral cat clinic in Yolo County (CA) where she mentored students on TNR and the humane care of feral cats.

From municipal shelters to private rescues, more organizations are embracing progressive approaches in feline leukemia programming. This panel featuring open admission city shelters and private rescues, moderated by Monica Frenden-Tarant, takes a look at how different organizations changed testing policies and implemented lifesaving solutions. We'll discuss the challenges they faced, hard-won

successes, and they'll share lessons learned to help guide you in practical, real-world decision-making to save more FeLV cats than ever before!

About Monica Frenden-Tarant

Monica is the Chief Innovation Officer: Feline Lifesaving at Cincinnati Animal CARE with The Joanie Bernard Foundation, and is helping organizations create the most humane city in the country for cats. A decade before anyone had heard of such a thing, she cut her teeth founding a trap-neuter-return organization in rural Illinois and pioneered one of the nation's first, and largest, working cat programs. In 2012, she joined Austin Pets Alive! where she led her team to an 88 percent growth in cat adoptions and helped Austin achieve a citywide 98 percent live release rate for cats. Monica then spent years as an instructor for the Maddie's Fund Lifesaving Academy teaching shelters best practices and innovative lifesaving programs, advancing research in feline retroviruses, and progressing public policy as a City of Austin Animal Advisory Commissioner. Monica is a frequent speaker and advisor on innovative ways to save every cat, including cats with feline leukemia, community cats, and shelter cats in need of medical care.

About Dr. Clarissa Funke

Dr. Funke is a facility veterinary medical director with Michigan Humane. She completed her Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree in 2012 from Michigan State University's College of Veterinary Medicine. She has worked with Michigan Humane for the past 10 years, and has spent several years working in a community clinic setting and exclusively in shelter medicine before graduating into a leadership role. Her special interests include neonatal kitten care, capacity for care and proactive population management and infectious disease control.

About Brett Kruger

Brett has worked in animal welfare for 9 years, and volunteered for 3 years prior to that. Currently, Brett is the Cat Program Manager at Cincinnati Animal CARE, a no-kill animal shelter providing municipal animal services and community resources for Hamilton County, Ohio. CARE adopts out FeLV+ cats and works with other rescues to place FeLV+ cats. Before joining CARE, Brett was with IndyHumane in Indianapolis, Indiana as their feline team manager where they transferred in FeLV+ cats from other central Indiana shelters. She has 6 cats (including Donatella, the reformed community cat in her speaker photo) and a 100-lb dog.

About Sarah Schulte

Sarah Schulte has been the Volunteer Coordinator at Ohio Alleycat Resource & Spay/Neuter Clinic (OAR) since early 2019. She started as an adopter, quickly became a volunteer and then was volunteering so much she was offered a staff position. She lives with her husband and 2 OAR alums - Sadie Smalls and Squawks Louise.

About Devon Smith

Devon Smith is the Executive Director of the League for Animal Welfare, a limited-admission shelter that takes in 1600 cats and dogs a year. Smith has been in animal welfare for two decades, and has had the good fortune to work, volunteer, and learn in organizations in the northeast, southeast, and Midwest. Smith has led both open- (Saint Frances Animal Center; Georgetown, SC) and limited-admission (League for Animal Welfare; Batavia, OH) shelters; a high-volume spay/neuter clinic (Ohio Alleycat Resource; Cincinnati, OH); and a trap/neuter/return group (Michiana Feral Cat Initiative; South Bend, IN). She gets particularly jazzed by projects that are collaborative, and focused on systemic issues in sheltering that affect the most vulnerable populations. Smith's current focus is on expanding access to care and adoption for cats with FIP and Feline Leukemia; and improving enrichment and behavior modification programs for large dogs.
